THE PASTOR'S MESSAGE

In Psalm 65:2a, David addresses God, *O you who hear prayer*. Two New Testament passages inform us as we approach the One who hears.

4 Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, rejoice. 5 Let your reasonableness be known to everyone. The Lord is at hand; 6 do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. 7 And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. (Philippians 4:4-7).

These verses, which come just before that well-known passage, *I can do all things through him who strengthens me* (4:13), were written by Paul while he was in prison for his faith. This circumstance adds depth and texture to his words.

He calls us to rejoice. From prison? Yes. Believers can always rejoice, even in the midst of conflict, adversity, and need, because joy does not rest in our circumstances, but *in the Lord*. Further, he tells us not to be anxious. What he is getting at is a deep worry that is incompatible with trust in God. Jesus had already warned against unbelieving anxiety (see Matt. 5:25-34). So we bring our requests before God with thanksgiving first because the attitude of gratitude is always an antidote to worry. Now we are ready to bring our deepest requests, needs, hopes, and fears before the Lord in prayer.

How will he answer? He will answer according to his most holy, wise, and perfect will. For us that can come as an obvious *yes, no,* or *wait*. One of the reasons I often recite these verses is verse seven. As you may have learned in the KJV, *And the peace of God, which passeth all understanding, shall keep your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus*. It is that glorious peace that comes only from outside ourselves, but manifests itself within us, that can get us through our current circumstances. Paul wrote from experience. We too need that peace to guard us against unbelief and despair in the face of affliction. And God offers it to us.

4 Since then we have a great high priest who has passed through the heavens, Jesus, the Son of God, let us hold fast our confession. 15 For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but one who in every respect has been tempted as we are, yet without sin. 16 Let us then with confidence draw near to the throne of grace, that we may receive mercy and grace to help in time of need (Hebrews 4:14-16).

I hold these verses close as a divine promise as I pray. Hebrews 4 and 5 teach us why we can with confidence draw near to the throne of grace, that we may receive mercy and grace to help in time of need. Because we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses. Why the double negative? The writer knows we are prone to doubt such wonderful news. So he is emphatic. Jesus can sympathize with our weaknesses. He knows and understands.

Not only was he in every respect ... tempted as we are, yet without sin, but also ⁷ In the days of his flesh, Jesus offered up prayers and supplications, with loud cries and tears, to him who was able to save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverence. ⁸ Although he was a son, he learned obedience through what he suffered. ⁹ And being made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation to all who obey him (5:7-9).

Because Jesus understands the afflictions we face in this life, the force of temptation without giving in, and the learned obedience included in these, he receives our prayers with sympathy and understanding. In fact, *he is able to save to the uttermost those who draw near to God through him, since he always lives to make intercession for them.* (7:25). Shall we pray?


